Featured Project:

Protecting the Best: Upper Luckiamute Enhancement





Project Snapshot

Goal: Improve salmonid and lamprey production and water storage in Luckiamute anchor habitat and enhance conditions in a unique high-elevation wetland.

Land Ownership: Manulife (Hancock Timber Resources) and Starker Forests, Inc.

Primary Funder: Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB)

Other Partners and Funders: Bonneville Environmental Foundation (BEF), Bureau of Land Management (BLM), US Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS), Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife (ODFW), Institute for Applied Ecology (IAE), Xerces Society, Trout Unlimited, Trask Consulting, Trask Design & Construction, D. Franco Contracting, Inc.

2021 Accomplishments:

- Freshwater mussels survey and steelhead redd survey completed
- Thinned overstocked douglas fir stand within 1.5 acres
- Placed 22 log structures along 1.5 miles of the project reach
- Inventoried and developed management plan for 8-acre wetland
- Seeded disturbed wetland areas with native seed gathered on-site

Officially titled, "Protecting the Best: Upper Luckiamute Mainstem Anchor Habitat Enhancement," this project is focused on restoring and enhancing the riparian (streamside) and aquatic habitat along the uppermost reaches of the Luckiamute River. Watershed analysis and mapping using NetMap software identified this area as an "anchor habitat" for native salmon and trout, meaning that this site has some of the greatest potential in the watershed to be restored back to health and to once again provide high quality spawning and rearing habitat for the native fisheries that flourished here in the past. During summer 2021, logs were harvested and placed in the river to improve fish habitat and slow down water velocity. Tightly packed stands of conifers were thinned to encourage the growth of larger diameter trees within the riparian area. Following log placement, volunteers gathered seeds from nearby native species and spread them in the project area to help remediate some of the impacts from the heavy equipment. IAE completed an inventory and restoration assessment of an 8-acre wetland along the river, during which 71 native species were identified — including a unique population of a checkermallow species that may be a hybrid of the federally threatened Nelson's checkermallow (Sidalcea nelsoniana) and meadow checkermallow (Sidalcea campestris).




