## Exploring "Hidden Worlds" at Winter Wildlife Event



The weather may have been a bit wet, but that didn't stop local families from heading over to Riverview Park for some fun wildlife-themed activities during Winter Wildlife Field Days!

On Saturday, March 23, local families disregarded the drizzle and descended upon Riverview Park in Independence for Winter Wildlife Field Days (WWFD), a bilingual family-friendly event that happens throughout the month of March and all across the mid-Willamette Valley. Visitors of all ages were lured to multiple fun wildlife-themed activities, including a dragonfly magnet craft, a jumping spider challenge, and a build-a-beaver-dam stream table activity.

The consensus? Not only did lots of kids have fun building dragonfly magnets out of clothespins, they also loved touching a stuffed great horned owl's soft feathers and watching a just-caught tadpole wiggle its way around a holding tank. Adults and children alike enjoyed learning about local birdlife and other wildlife neighbors as part of the interactive experiences offered at each table. And even the most hesitant participants stuck their hands in (or should we say, stuck their paws in?) the water and had a blast building beaver dams in the stream table!

This last event in the WWFD series was hosted by the LWC, Polk Soil & Water Conservation District and Greenbelt Land Trust, in partnership with US Fish & Wildlife Service - which is the lead organizer for this month-long event designed to engage youth and adults in getting outside to learn about and appreciate the many different types of local wildlife that can be seen and heard during winter and early spring.

To highlight the vital, yet often unseen, creatures in our midst, the WWFD theme for this year was "Hidden Worlds." Many of the activities at the Field Stations were focused on connecting the community with these fascinating wildlife neighbors. Greenbelt's beaver-focused stream table display not only provided a fun way to see how beaver activity can alter the course of a river and create new wetland habitat, it also included educational information about the many benefits that beavers can bring to a landscape. OSU's Department of Fisheries, Wildlife and Conservation Sciences displayed a tank containing a tadpole, dragonfly nymph, and other small creatures collected

that morning from nearby Ash Creek. In the rush of daily life, it's easy to miss the teeming web of life that surrounds us. But the health of these tiny watershed residents can be a window into the well-being of the entire ecosystem, including the rivers and landscapes we rely on.

Events like this are an excellent opportunity to highlight the interconnectedness of the plant, animal and human communities that live in and depend upon healthy rivers and landscapes, and can inspire a new appreciation for even the smallest of critters that make their home in the watershed. Building stronger relationships between people and place is what the LWC's *Love Your Watershed* program is all about, and we were honored to be included in this fantastic event again this year!

In addition to all the families and individuals that stopped by Riverview Park to enjoy this event, a HUGE shout-out goes out to the many volunteers who helped set up and take down the tables and tents, guided event-goers through the activities, and answered questions of all kinds. Seeing volunteers in action allows community members to witness the rewards of giving back to the watershed firsthand, inspiring them to learn more and take action. We are so grateful for the time, energy and enthusiasm that helped make this event - and all of our community events - possible!

## LWC Staff Members to Present at CONNECT+ Conference

### "Strategic Knotweed Control in the Mid-Willamette Valley: Persistence and Adaptive Management"

Aubrey Cloud, Project Manager for the Luckiamute and Marys River Watershed Councils, will share lessons learned from 14 years of sustained knotweed control in the Luckiamute and Marys River basins. This legacy of work has yielded triumphs and challenges, and has demonstrated what is and isn't possible when committing to long-term management of a priority invasive species on the landscape scale.

### "The Workplace Ecosystem: Management Tools for Employee Satisfaction and Retention"

Maya Cook, LWC Operations Coordinator, will lay out an approach to leadership that can increase staff productivity and unlock the full potential of your team.
